Vision, Mission, Goals and Guiding Philosophy

Vision Statement

To be a school district with excellent staff, programs and student achievements.

Mission Statement

To prepare lifelong learners to lead productive and rewarding lives in a changing world.

District Goals

1. Internal School Climate

The Abbotsford School District will work to improve the internal school climate. Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports will continue to be the focal point for this goal. School assemblies, Kindness Counts incentives, developmental guidance, celebrations, district-wide anti-bullying messages and teaching strategies, etc. will also be studied and incorporated during the school year.

The Abbotsford Elementary and Middle/High School will reduce office referrals by 5% for the 2016-17 school year as compared with the 2015-16 data.

2. Safety

The Abbotsford School district will continue to develop its school safety plan. This includes training all staff (teachers, substitutes, coaches and support staff) and students in ALICE protocols. The training will include two live drills throughout the year. The district will improve security and surveillance systems to align with ALICE, including security camera and phone capabilities. Communication with school stakeholders will also be important. The district will continue to work with the City of Abbotsford to improve student safety on their way to and from school. Safe Routes to School will be a focus as we work towards grant approval.

3. The Abbotsford School District will focus on student writing for the 2016-17 school year. This will be a multi-year goal.
MS/HS:

The middle/high school will finish a writing curriculum review, study writing curriculum options and best practices, establish a school-wide writing rubric and have a recommendation for the board for a school-wide writing curriculum. In 2017-18, a gradual implementation of agreed upon writing curriculum will start.

4. Data Management and Achievement Growth

High performing and high achieving school districts can directly link their success with the wise use of student data to inform instructional and behavioral decision-making. With the purchase of EduCLIMBER for the 2019-20 school year staff will:

- Receive training in how to upload, manipulate (triangulate) and appropriately utilize and understand numerous forms of student data.
- In PLCs, leadership teams, grade-level teams and other collaborative groupings use data to inform academic and behavioral decision-making;
- Establish baselines and growth targets regarding student achievement; and
- Continue to develop research-based and data driven interventions for both struggling and high-achieving students

5. Increased Stakeholder Involvement

The Superintendent, along with building leadership, will seek out innovative and creative ways to bring ALL community stakeholders to the educational table. Specifically, targeted strategies will be studied and incorporated into current communication efforts to more fully integrate our richly diverse populations. This is a multi-year goal.
